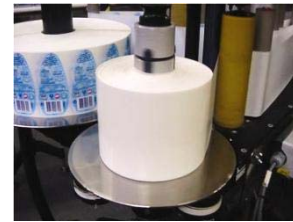




How To Recycle Release Liner ...

○ DEFINE TYPE & VOLUME of liner you have:

- Type of Liner?
- How it is being collected?
- Volume, Width and Total Footage.
- If possible weigh a roll and then figure out how many rolls you have per month.



○ PACKAGING methods:

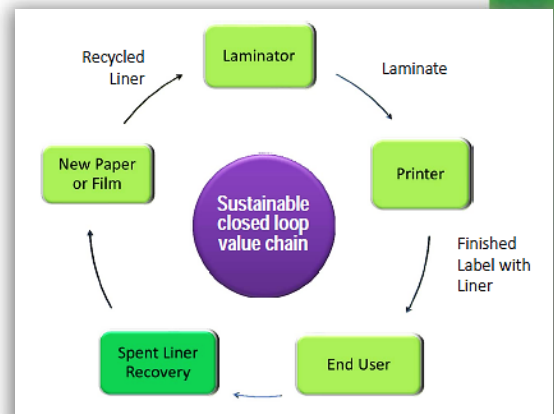
- Paper: Over 5" width rolls should be wound up on a core and stacked neatly on skids
- Paper: Under 5" or hard to rewind rolls should be collected in thick walled gaylord boxes without cores.
- Film: Collect in thick walled gaylord boxes, ideally without core, wound onto itself.

○ SEGREGATION:

- Reclaimed liner must be contaminant free from other materials/substrates.
- Less than 2% labels left on rolls.
- Minimal trash in boxes.
